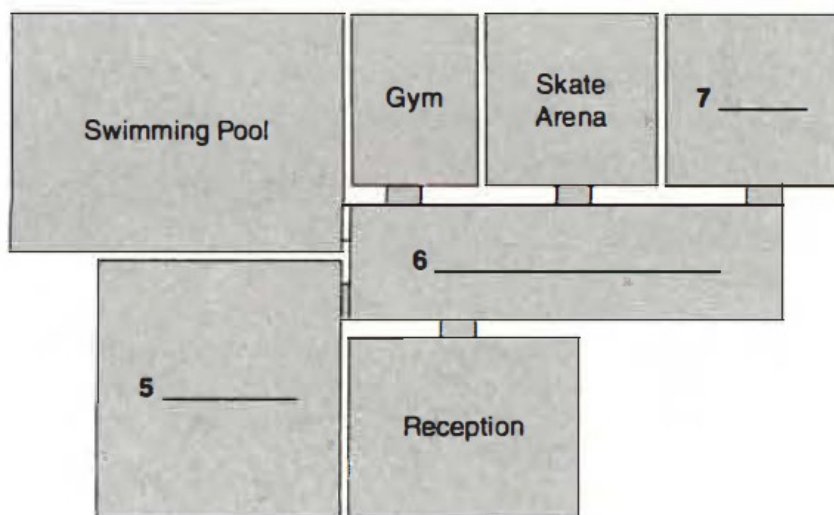

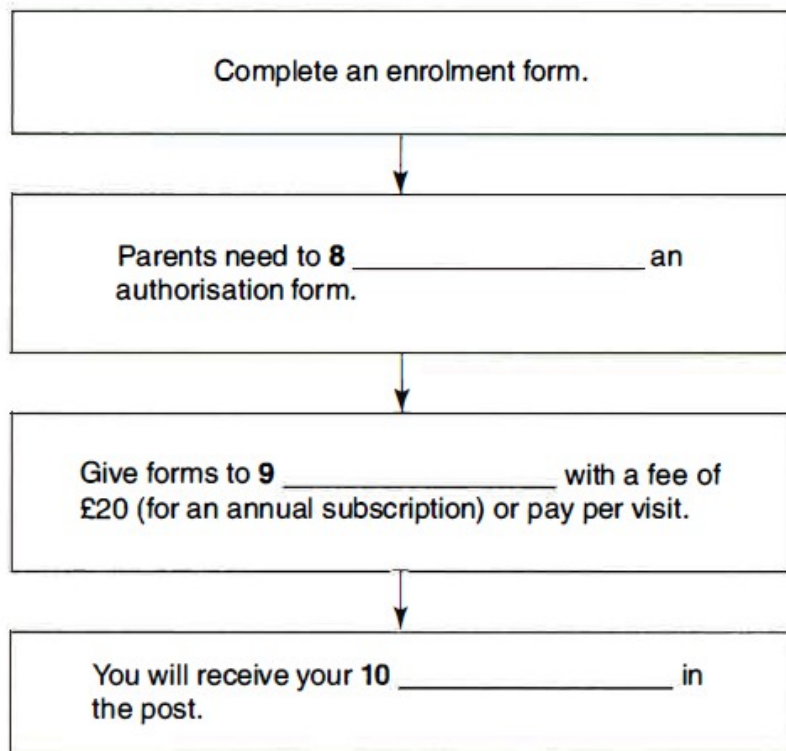

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Kizhi

Located in Lake Onega, Kizhi is the most popular island to visit in Russia. Having only 5,5 km in length and max 1,4 km in width, the island annually attracts about 200.000 tourists from all (1) the world. Most of them come to see the incredible collection of monuments of Russian wooden architecture.

Today the island is (2) known for its Museum Site of History and Architecture, where early wooden barns, houses, a windmill, and several churches (3) collected and restored as part of an open-air museum.

Kizhi's most famous architectural ensemble includes two 18th-century wooden churches: the Church of the Transfiguration and the Church of the Intercession as (4) as an octagonal wooden bell tower built in 1862 and considerably reconstructed in 1874.

The Preobranzhenskaya Church, 121 feet in height, (5) its three tiers and 22 cupolas, is often compared (6) St. Basil's Cathedral in Moscow's Red Square. The Preobranzhenskaya Church houses a collection of wonderful iconostases. The Pokorovskaya Church has 10 cupolas, and its interior is decorated with icons (7) locally in the 17th and 18th centuries.
